

Project Overview [50-250 words] including type of assistance and approach to ensuring that the aid responds to a negative public health or economic impact through an eligible use that either addresses the needs of an impacted or disproportionately impacted population or community OR is in proportion to an identified harm:

Individuals living unsheltered are among the most negatively, and disproportionately, impacted by the COVID 19 emergency. The pandemic has made it increasingly challenging for this population to understand and navigate the options available for support and assistance. Individuals who relied on seeing providers face-to-face are now challenged to access the internet, computers, and other technology, which impacts their ability to receive support in a timely manner. Access to reliable transportation is also an ongoing challenge to many unsheltered residents. This project would provide funds to help unsheltered individuals overcome these challenges and provide the intensive support needed to access resources and services to become more stable. Funding would go toward more case management support, so that there are more people available to reach out and connect Everett's unsheltered population with the best available services, medical care plans, treatment, and shelter options, as well as continuous follow up, feedback, and guidance. Funds will also help bridge some the gaps in providing that care, such as lack of transportation or securing identification.

II. STATUTORY ELIGIBLE USE

The Project complies with the following Statutory Eligible Use: to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency or its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits, or to aid impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality.

III. REPORTING

The Agency shall submit to the County such reports as the County requests pursuant to the requirements of federal, state, and local law, regulations, and guidance as applicable. At a minimum, the Agency shall submit, in a format prescribed by the County, the following reports:

IV. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- A. The City of Everett shall provide case management services to residents of Everett in Snohomish County. Services will be provided in the following zip codes: 98201, 98203, 98204, 98206, 98207, 98208 and 98213.
- B. The City of Everett will provide case management services in the community to Individuals who are homeless, unsheltered, may be experiencing behavioral health issues, lack employment, and may have additional unmet needs.
- C. The City of Everett shall utilize funding to increase case management support for vulnerable unsheltered residents whose behavioral health needs and access to services has been negatively affected by COVID-19 by hiring a Case Management Coordinator and additional case managers.
- D. The City of Everett shall ensure that local partners are aware of this project, have contact information available to provide to Individuals in need of this service, are visible in the community and other methods to ensure potential participants are aware of the services provided by this program.
- E. The City of Everett shall ensure Individuals who meet criteria of being Snohomish County residents, are unsheltered, and have unmet needs (such as but not limited to behavioral health needs, food, transportation, clothing) are provided case management services.

- F. The Key Performance Indicators Key Performance Indicators are:
 - Referrals of individuals and successful connections to adequate and stable housing, detox, mental health and substance use disorder treatment.
 - 2. Outcomes of the connection to services including completion of mental health and/or substance use disorder assessment, engagement in recommended services, how many Individuals are in some form of transitional housing and how many have secured permanent housing.
- G. The City of Everett Case Management Project shall maintain individual files wherein eligibility, service notes, referrals, and performance indicators are recorded and documented.
- H. The City of Everett Case Management Project shall document the following unduplicated numbers as applicable:
 - 1. The number of Individuals who were met and talked with.
 - 2. The number of Individuals who engaged in services.
 - 3. The number of Individuals assisted with housing.
 - 4. The number of Individuals assisted with accessing mental health services and how many engaged in those services.
 - 5. The number of Individuals assisted with accessing withdrawal management services and how many engaged in those services.
 - 6. The number of Individuals assisted with accessing substance use disorder treatment services and how many engaged in those services.
- I. The City of Everett shall electronically submit invoices and backup documentation by the tenth (10th) day of the month following services. Exception: December invoices shall be submitted no later than January 5, 2023, and January 5, 2024.
- J. The City of Everett shall match the ARPA funds granted through this Contract. The City shall ensure the funds through this Contract are fully expended by December 31, 2023.
